FOOD DRIVE

Thank you to those who participated in the NCJW Food Drive!

Did you know: Many people in America struggle to meet their basic needs. Job loss and unexpected expenses can suddenly force a family to choose between buying food and paying bills. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, Louisiana faced some of the highest rates of hunger in the country, particularly among children and seniors. More than 750,000 Louisianians experienced food insecurity, meaning they did not always know where their next meal might come from or what it may consist of.

With the first stay-at-home order, thousands of Louisiana families were suddenly affected by school closures, job loss and cut hours, and began to experience food insecurity as a result. Feeding America, the nation's largest anti-hunger relief organization estimates that Louisiana is home to the highest rates of pandemic food insecurity in the country, affecting I-in-5 Louisianians and nearly I-in-3 Louisiana children. And a 2020 survey of LA food banks revealed an 80% rise in utilization above typical levels, with nearly 40% of those clients brand new to emergency food systems.

We asked members to drop off donations of food and personal items at chair Dana Keren's

front porch to help with this growing issue. We partnered with new NCIW member Janie Glade and her organization Gladewaves. Gladewaves has set up the Big Red Box Food Pantry Program, which works with churches to set up and fill food pantries in demographically diverse communities. With the help of NCIW members, Gladewaves was able to make additional weekday fills for two full weeks to all eight of their barrier-free food pantries. This means that many single parents, children, senior citizens and families who need a meal or two to make ends meet will benefit as a result of NCJW's generosity. In addition, our section raised over \$400 that went directly to Gladewaves to support their mission and operations.

Subjects of interest to a wide range of our members have been explored this spring in a three-part series entitled "Cross-Generational Issues for Women".

Areas of concern included feminism as seen through a historical lens, the recent pandemic-related mental health roller coaster, and the unraveling of women's employment due to COVID.

The series was co-sponsored by the National Council of Jewish Women Greater New Orleans Section, Hadassah New Orleans, and the Jewish Endowment Foundation of Louisiana. It was generously underwritten by a grant from the Linda and Jack Zoller Designated Fund at the Jewish Endowment Foundation.

The first program in the series, "From the Second Wave to the Tidal Wave", began with a documentary film about the feminist movement by the filmmaker and program moderator Pam Maus, followed by a lively panel discussion by Ms. Maus and three women from the documentary.

Second in the series was a seminar entitled "Emotional Well-Being in the Age of COVID", which was presented by Dr. Robin Gurwitch, a psychologist and professor at Duke University Medical Center specializing in child and family health and trauma. Dr. Gurwitch focused on the connection between the pandemic and mental health issues impacting women such as depression, isolation and thoughts of suicide in both themselves and their family members.

The final program in the series, called "Work/ Life Imbalance", is scheduled to be held May 13th and will focus on the fact that women's employment is in chaos right now, with women having been thrown out of their jobs or withdrawing from their jobs due to COVID. The presentation will be moderated by former state Representative and political consultant Julie Stokes, who will direct a panel of three women experts in workforce development,

employment policy, and human resources. They will examine COVID-related issues such as the first female employment recession, loss of seniority, and long-term outcomes for women in the labor market. Other non-COVID related issues of women's employment such as wage disparities and the Imposter Syndrome will also be touched on.

Miriam's Tambourine Creative Art Project

NCJW GNO partnered with the Bubbe Club and JCDS (Jewish Community Day School) for a Zoom pre-Passover creative art activity. JCDS's wonderful art teacher, Abby Wetsman, taught participants how to make "Miriam's Tambourine of Hope." Abby also explained how to adapt the project to different ages and skill levels. The project highlighted the role of Miriam and her tambourine in the Passover story. Art supplies, including wooden embroidery hoops, fabric, bells, and plastic needles, were provided by the Bubbe Club. The bubbes and special friends loved the project and the collaboration, and look forward to additional collaborations between NCJW GNO, the Bubbe Club, and JCDS in the future! Later the bubbes sent in pictures of their grandchildren's wonderful tambourine creations. The project was co-chaired by Cathy Bart and Carol Newman.

New Orleans Family Justice Center



As part of our commitment to improve the lives of our most vulnerable women, children and families, NCJW-GNO has provided funds to the New Orleans Family Justice Center for several years. NOFJC is a partnership of agencies dedicated to ending family violence, child abuse, sexual assault and stalking through prevention as well as a coordinated response in a single location. Their comprehensive, on-site, free services include legal, law enforcement, healthcare and social services for survivors and family members.

Due to the Covid pandemic and the double-pronged challenge of having to remain in their often-unsafe homes as well as losing their jobs, survivors have needed even more assistance to remain safe. NOFJC stepped up to the challenge. Between March 2020 and November 2020, NOFJC served 1,539 clients, and provided over 7,105 hours of services while also providing emergency shelter, rental and utility assistance and personal clothing/items.

This year (2021) NCJW's funds will be used to provide 7 scholarships for children to attend Camp HOPEAmerica - Louisiana in Mississippi in June 2021. Camp HOPE is the first camping and mentoring initiative in the United States

to focus on children and teens exposed to domestic violence. While having fun, the campers learn how to believe in themselves, in others and in their dreams with the help of evidence-based and values-based curriculum. NCJW-GNO is proud to be able to support the campers as well as NOFIC.




